A Dream Come True

t has been a dream of mine since I was a Young Rider to train in Wellington, Florida for part of the winter season. Although I had several opportunities to go for short periods of time, I really wanted to stay for a longer duration to be fully immersed in the whole "Wellington" experience. This last winter, I was fortunate to spend two months with my horses and incredible clients in the Winter Equestrian Capital of the World. There is much to see and learn, I cannot emphasize enough how important it is to get out of your comfort zone and home area to stretch your learning boundaries.

Many opportunities surrounded me, including being able to take advantage of training on a masters level, with Charlotte Bredahl (an Olympian, former FEI Judge, and current USEF Development Program Coach). Fortunately, I

have worked closely with Charlotte a number of times in the past, so I was appreciative to have had the chance to work with her on a more consistent basis this past winter in Wellington.

Due to the Kentucky Dressage Association's Education Grant, I was fortunate to be able to have weekly lessons on my 8 year old Dutch Warmblood gelding, Killian TF. We have been knocking on the door of Third Level, and have a goal of qualifying for the Developing Prix St. Georges in 2024. The focus of the lessons concentrated on tempo, bend, and rider position.

A recent endeavor of mine, with all of my horses, has been to focus on proper tempo. The trot and canter should not change in tempo during collection, where the horse should jump off the ground more, rather than slow down. I understand the concept, but in practice, I

didn't understand it as well as I thought. We played with numerous transitions within the gaits, to help me feel and understand this idea more thoroughly. We practiced a number of transitions between the working and collected trots and centers on circles as well as within various movements. This also greatly assisted the adding of additional expression within the gaits- where the horse does not need to speed up to be more expressive.

Another weak spot I discovered in my training with Killian is the idea of whole body bend. Killian stands a massive 17.3 hands, so there are a multitude of body parts that need to work together in harmony. Often times, I find myself accidentally pushing his inside hindleg out of circles and out of the corners, instead of pushing it under my seat bones. With the massive size of his neck, I also struggle creating too much bend in the neck where the shoulders and rest of his body have trouble following along properly. An exercise I found helpful, which will create a proper nose-to-tail bend, is the shoulder-in to half-pass and then back to shoulder-in. This exercise assists in the half-passes to keep the proper bend, without having the horse fall on his nose and shoulder. The traverse on the wall is also very helpful, as sometimes allowing the outside of Killian's body to come around my inside leg was difficult for me.

A final topic we focused on was my body position. I have often found that with riding so many young horses, I have a tendency to want to help more in my body than what is actually helpful for the horse. I had to really concentrate and make an effort to keep my upper body as still as possible, while also

keeping my hips as supple as I could while following my horse's strides. I needed to focus on keeping my hands soft and forward. I had to remind myself to keep my inside leg, right at his girth, and outside hip back, both in the shoulder-in's and half-passes.

Since returning home, I now make a conscious effort to keep these ideas and

teaching points at the forefront of my mind while training all of the horses in my program, especially the more highly educated ones. I can't emphasize how much I learned from these valuable lessons in Wellington, and I am excited to use all of these exercises and training points in my program for many years to come! I am so grateful that the Ken-

tucky Dressage Association offers grants like these to Open riders. This year, I was able to expand my education more so than I have in a long time. I am also grateful to Charlotte Bredahl for all of her knowledge, and for taking the time to fit me in to her busy schedule.
